At the beginning of her term in July 2024, San Pablo City Emerald Lions Club President Lion Maria Theresa E. del Rio, MJF set her sights on a deeply meaningful mission: to protect and uplift the welfare of young students, particularly those silently suffering from vision impairments.

Cabrera, SIGHT FOR KIDS (SFK) Chairperson for Laguna B Region, the Emerald Lions embarked on an ambitious goal — to bring the Sight for Kids project not just to one school, but to sixteen (16) public elementary schools located in the remote outskirts of San Pablo City. CALAMBA CITY, Laguna - A price freeze on basic goods is now in effect in Laguna after the province was placed under state of calamity, the Department of Trade and Industry-Laguna said.

"The DTI-Laguna informs all consumers and retailers that prices of basic necessities in the Province of Laguna shall be automatically frozen at their prevailing prices or placed under automatic price control for a period of 60 days," the DTI said in a social media post late Friday.

The SSS Pension Reform Program was approved by the (SSC) under Resolution No. 340-s.2025 dated 11 July 2025. Corresponding SSS Circular on the Program shall be published accordingly in a newspaper of general circulation.

Anchored on Republic Act

No. 11199 (Social Security Act of 2018), particularly Section 4 empowering the SSC to adjust pension benefits, this reform answers the long-standing call for higher pensions while ensuring the fund's long-term

"We've heard the clamor for higher pensions loud and clear," said SSS President and CEO Robert Joseph M. De Claro. "With the guidance of Finance Secretary and SSC Chairpercareful actuarial review, we are rolling out a rational and sustainable pension increase that uplifts all pensioners without compromising the fund's actuarial soundness.

More than a homecoming

there are rare ones that feel like stepping back into your own skin. That is what happened on July 27, 2025, at the UP Visavas Little Theater, where scores of educators—some gray-haired, some newly promoted, most somewhere in between—gathered not just to catch up, but to rekindle what it meant to be shaped by the Master of Education program of UPV. It was not nostalgia that drove us there. It was recognition. That in these trying times, coming together is not a luxury, but a responsibility.

I did not enter UP through the traditional gates. As a grade schooler, I already dreamed of it,

ecause in the end, it was never just about UP. It was about the promises made quietly under mango trees, the lessons passed between batches, the names that live in your phone more than in your diploma.

as far as my over protective mom was concerned. Life, as it often does, rerouted me. For decades, I walked alongside UP students and faculty—joining rallies, planning campaigns, sharing meals, and holding space for honest conversations. I stood with them in will, word, work, and worldview, but not yet as someone who truly, organically belonged within those halls.

age 42, that old, that I finally set foot as an official UP student, not for Physics as planned, but for Guidance. a

second choice that, according to my daughters, turned out to be a blessing in disguise. What unfolded was not just academic rigor. It was personal excavation. And often, transformation begins when one least expects it—over coffee-fueled weekends, tearful processing circles, and a group chat that seemed more alive than our thesis folders ever were.

Our 2019 MEd Guidance batch was a curious mix. Ten personalities, bound not just by course codes, but by stories. Most were younger, fresh from other UP undergraduate programs. It was the second oldest, a father of two daughters, navigating school admin chores while supporting theirs. Our professors were not just instructors—they were mirrors. In Prof. Alobba's magic circle, we learned that healing begins with being heard. In Prof. Diaz's minimalist classroom, stripped of slides and scripts, we learned that thinking is not about memorization, but meaning (or else, you drop the subject). Our share of academic gods and goblins came with their own rituals. There was law and attraction, literal and theoretical. There were weekend marathons of Prof. Jovy's ShareTea-fueled "tsikahan," the occasional tear, and a lot of late-night paper-crunching under the spell of caffeine and deadlines.

The beauty of the program was not just in what it taught, but in how it unearthed. Prof. Aileen, Prof. Carla and Prof. 'Pilosopo Tarso' made us reflect so deeply, we started socio-culturizing, psycho-analyzing, and philosophizing not just our past but our romantic detours, our career regrets, even our childhood dreams. Prof. Pete made us take personality tests and dissect the results—with permission and a lot of self-awareness unlocked. It was both humbling and hilarious. Then came the board exams. Seven of us flew to Manila, holed up in a B-complex AirBnB—six women and me, the lone Ginoo. No monkeying around, only nerdy and funny review sessions. We passed. All of us. Because when you are formed in UP, you carry not just notes and citations, but the unspoken pact to lift each other up. Up until now, I suppose, the program prides itself of having a perfect passing rate.

But this story is not just about surviving academic hurdles. It is about the quiet vow that followed. UP, for all its public prestige, demands something more inward. It does not simply celebrate brilliance. It expects conscience. It does not parade your letters after your name. It asks, what do you do with them? This was the heart of the homecoming's theme: "Maroonong Guro ng Bayan." A clever fusion of "maroon," the color we wear, and "marunong," the wisdom we aspire

to. But it goes beyond wordplay. It is about living the truths we profess.

In our current educational landscape, this message could not be timelier. The Philippine Institute for Development Studies (PIDS, 2023) reported that teacher burnout has reached record highs, with many educators handling multiple roles beyond teaching. Add to that the lingering effects of the pandemic, the digital divide, and children still grappling with basic literacy and wellness issues. These are not statistics to us. These are our students, our schools, our daily realities. When one principal in Iloilo told me she holds weekend review classes under a mango tree-without electricity, using carton flashcards and a hand-drawn chart—it was not a sob story. It was a portrait of commitment She said, "This is the promise I made when I graduated from UP." No mic drop. No drama. Just truth.

It is moments like that which remind us that the impact of UP education is measured not by citations or podiums, but by presence. The kind that shows up on a muddy footpath, with no projector or WiFi, just voice and heart. UP does not create perfect educators. It hopes to create purposeful ones. Educators who ask hard questions, even when there are no easy answers. Those who speak truth to power in the faculty room and hold space for a crying student long after office hours. Those who fix fights, publish research, win grants-and still manage to listen without judgment during a counseling session on a random Tuesday

The launch of the UPV Master of Education Alumni Association (UPVMEAA), after 45 years of waiting is not just organizational housekeeping. It is a community of conscience. The Constitution, which we ratified that day, was crafted not with bureaucracy in mind, but with shared values-equity, collaboration, mentorship. This is not an alumni group for selfies and reunions, although there were plenty of those. It is for building bridges across batches, across schools, across gaps that policy alone cannot close. It is about giving back not from a place of surplus, but of shared struggle. Because the truth is, many of us still hustle—between deadlines, meetings, emotional labor, and unpaid overtime. But what UP taught us is that you do not wait for perfect conditions to do meaningful work. You just start.

That Sunday, between laughter and logistics, we remembered the professors, staff, and classmates who shaped our lens. Each name, each class, each odd joke and inside story—they all became threads in a tapestry of educators still figuring it out, still committed to figuring it out

That is the gift of being formed in a place that do not just teach—but form. Not through grandeur, but through grit. It is in the late nights at the library, in the comical stress of group reports, in the whispered comfort of a batchmate who tells you, "You got this." It is in the thesis consultations that feel more like therapy. It is in the moments where learning becon the mind and more about meaning. This, more than anything, is what UP stands for. It holds space for the critical, the creative, and the compassionate to converge.

As educators, our power lies not in the size of our classrooms, but in the sincerity of our ing. Whether in highland barangays, city schools, or alternative learning centers, the need is the same: to show up with competence and conscience. The M.Ed. program, especially in Guid ance, has taught us that sometimes, the most radical thing you can do is simply listen well. And sometimes, to love your students enough to hold them accountable.

The UPVMEAA may have just been born, but its heartbeat is already strong. Because it beats in every principal staying late to draft policies no one will praise. It echoes in every counselor who reminds a struggling learner that failure is not final. It breathes in every teacher who teaches not just for the board exam, but for life.

And so we go back—not as former students, but as co-builders of what Philippine education still must become: rooted in reason, anchored in empathy, and courageous er demand better. The "maroonong guro ng bayan" is not a hero. But they are not invisible either. They are simply everywhere—quietly holding the line, one learner at a time

Because in the end, it was never just about UP. It was about the promises made quietly under mango trees, the lessons passed between batches, the names that live in your phone more than in your diploma. It was about finding your people, your pulse, your place in the mission. And when we stood there, hand on heart, recalling the quake-shaken Compre exams and the manic rush to finish capstones, it became clear: this was not just an event. It was a recommitment. A return not to where we once were-but to who we have always chosen to be.

ST. PETER FABER'S COMPASS

Each August 1st, we honor the quiet reflective man whose legacy endures particularly for those with an inclination for listening, healing, and inner transformation. This is St. Peter Faber, co-founder of the Society of Je-

sus and Pope Francis' go-to Jesuit, whose death occurred on this date in 1546. His name does not ring as clearly as that of Jesuits St. Ignatius of Loyola or St. Francis Xavier, but for those willing to slow the pace of life enough to listen, Faber's life speaks just as clearly today as it has for centuries past.

Faber grew up among neither church walls nor high books. He was an average shepherd boy from Savoy, France, with big aspirations to study—and made it to the University of Paris. It was there that he encountered two men whose influ-

ence would forever alter his life and direct the Church: Xavier and Ignatius. While one chased brilliance and the other chased purpose, Faber offered something rare: presence. He helped Ignatius with philosophy: lanatius helped him with the soul. Their bond was forged in shared questions, not just shared ideas.

Pope Francis has praised Faber not for big miracles but for something deeper-what he calls "interior discernment." Faber was deeply attuned to the auiet

shifts of the heart, both in himself and others. Even those who disagreed with him found it hard not to open up. Jesuit historian John Padberg called Faber's spirituality "spiritual breath-—aentle, honest, and deeply human.

At the height of the Protestant Reformation, while many picked sides, Faber chose compassion. He walked across Europe—often barefoot—not to argue, but to understand. He did not seek to win debates, but to pray with people by name. As Pope Francis noted, Faber could talk to anyone. even his critics. That kind of openness is sorely needed today—in churches, schools, barangays, and families torn by

Perhaps Faber's most enduring gift is his Memoriale, his spiritual diary. There are no lofty speeches or grand achievements—just the raw, daily rhythms of a man trying to see God in everything: in fatigue, in fear, in stubborn bishops, in strangers. He believed God wasn't only found in clarity but also in tension. That resonates with many teachers and public servants today—those quietly holding the line, despite red tape,

exhaustion, and limited support. Reflection, EDITORIAL for them as for Faber, is not escape. It is fuel for staying whole.

His spirituality was relational and grounded. He believed every person had a guardian an-

gel and that true dialogue begins with reverence, not strategy. That humility gave him the courage to walk into conflict-heavy places like Worms and Ratisbon in Germany where Protestants and Catholics distrusted each other. Yet he stayed gentle in a world turning harsh, patient in a culture rushing ahead. For Faber, every encounter was a chance for grace.

His influence did not come from power or position. He rarely raised his voice, but people listened. He didn't chase titles, but shaped hearts. He did not seek fame, but quietly

> inspired those who would later take the Jesuit mission around the world. This is the kind of leadership we need today—leaders who listen deeply, who steady a room without stealing the spotlight.

> Faber's life offers a quiet kind of encouragement to all who feel unseen or overwhelmed—teachers, social workers, parents, even students. You do not have to be the loudest to make a difference. You do not always need the perfect words—just the courage to stay, to care,

to keep showing up. We live in a world full of noise but short on reflection. Faber reminds us what it looks like to act with depth, not just urgency.

When Pope Francis canonized Faber in 2013—without requiring a miracle—he sent a message. Some saints are honored for what they did. Faber was honored for who he was: kind, thoughtful, grounded, and true. He made wise decisions without losing his heart. His canonization was a celebration of

Now more than ever, Faber's way feels urgent. In a world addicted to speed, outrage, and distraction, his life whispers a different path: slow down, reflect, connect. Not to retreat but to serve better, with more love.

So this August 1, let us remember Faber not as a figure from the past, but as a compass for our time. In every teacher burning the midnight oil, every barangay captain calming a heated debate, every parent choosing presence over punishment—Faber lives on. Because what this world needs is not more noise. It needs more Faber.

From copra to VCO: Time to rethink our national coconut strategy

The humble coconut—long dubbed the "tree of life"—is still at the center of our national livelihood and economy. Yet despite its rich potential, we continue to make decisions that yield low value, low income, and little long-term vision for our

Case in point: the recent move by the Department of Agriculture (DA) to promote the use of copra meal as animal feed due to the global shortage of soybeans.

ow is the time to convene a Cabinet Cluster dedicated to this purpose. Let us align our science, trade, agriculture, and health policies around a unified coconut strategy.

While this may be a practical short-term solution, it is not a sustainable national strategy. We must ask: are we extracting the highest value from our coco-

nuts, or are we stuck in outdated practices? The Copra Conundrum Let's face it: making copra from fresh coconuts already causes value loss. When fresh coconut meat is dried into copra, much of the oil's nutritional and economic value

is degraded or wasted. Worse, copra is prone to contamination—from vermin to salmonella—which affects both human and animal health. Its shelf life and hygiene standards are sim-

ply not up to par in today's competitive market. While copra meal is sold cheaply as livestock feed, it represents the lowest rung in the value chain. It is a byproduct of a byproduct. Yes, it's better than waste—but we should be aiming higher. Cooking Oil vs.

Virgin Coconut Oil On the next rung up is coconut cooking oil—particularly Refined, Bleached, and Deodorized (RBD) oil. It serves as a staple in homes and industries, both locally and abroad. The market is steady, but margins are not exactly eye-popping. It also re-

quires refining infrastructure, and for small farmers and producers, that's a high barrier to entry. At the top of the value chain sits Virgin Coconut Oil (VCO)—a premium product in the global health, food, and cosmetic markets. It requires no heavy refining and retains the coconut's full natural benefits. It fetches significantly higher prices, especially in export markets.

Yet despite its proven profitability, we have not gone all-in on promoting VCO as a national strategy. A Cabinet Cluster for Coconut Value Optimization Instead of relying on fragmented decisions by individual departments, it's time for a unified

I propose that the President establish a Cabinet Cluster for Coconut Industry Development and Value Optimization. This is more than just a policy group—it would be an empowered executive cluster with cross-sectoral coordination authority, similar to the clusters on food security, climate change, and digital infrastructure. Its core mandates should be:

1. Shifting the National Value Chain Focus Transition from low-value copra

production to high-value coconut products like VCO, coco sugar, coconut flour, and functional health products.

2. Strengthening Farmer Participation Equip coconut farmers and cooperatives with training, technology, and access to decentralized VCO production meth-

3. Research and Development Mobilize the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) to develop new processing techniques, storage methods, and product diversification models.

4. Market Development and Branding Task the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) to position Filipino VCO as a global premium brand, just like Thai rice or Colombian coffee.

5. Food Safety and Standards Through the Department of Health (DOH) and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), ensure that coconut products meet export-grade safety and labeling standards. 6. Inclusive Finance and Investment Engage the Department of Finance

(DOF) and the Philippine Coconut Authority (PCA) to ensure that coconut levy funds are invested in VCO and value-added infrastructure, not in perpetuating the old copra system.

7. Agro-industrial Support Let the Department of Agriculture (DA) and the Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR) prioritize VCO production in farm-to-market programs, and make coconut diversification a centerpiece of rural develop-

This Cabinet Cluster must be chaired by no less than the Executive Secretary or directly by the President himself, to ensure national alignment and rapid imple-

This isn't just about coconut products—it's about uplifting millions of coconut farmers who remain among the poorest in the country. It's about turning agricultural waste into wealth, and building a resilient, climate-smart economy. It's

also about strategic national planning. Why rely on foreign soybean imports when we can feed the world with high-value coconut products? Why settle for bulk exports when we can sell prestige-grade oils? Let's remember that we are one of the top coconut-producing na-

tions on Earth. That should mean something. But unless we evolve beyond copra and into full-value utilization, we will always be shortchanging ourselves. Instead of choosing between using copra for

animal feeds or cooking oil, let's choose the higher road. Let us invest in the future of coconut—and that future is in Virgin Coconut Oil and other high-value derivatives. Now is the time to convene a Cabinet Cluster

dedicated to this purpose. Let us align our science, trade, agriculture, and health policies around a unified coconut strategy.

In doing so, we don't just build a stronger industry—we build a better life for every coconut farmer in the Philippines. The tree of life deserves nothing less.

2025 unless sooner lifted by the provincial government.

Automatic price control was implemented in three Calabarzon provinces namely Cavite, Rizal and Laguna including parts of Batangas province following the onslaught of tropical cyclones Crising, Dante and Emong, combined with the effects of the southwest monsoon or Habagat.

The Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Rizal passed Resolution No. 408, formalizing the declaration after the province was battered with torrential rains and flooding.


"It is imperative that the Province of Rizal be declared under a state of calamity to give substantial leeway to all local government units in the province to utilize their Quick Response Funds and relief services and assistance to affected Rizaleños," the resolution read.

These declarations are also necessary for local government units to access their Quick Response Fund (QRF) or 30% of its Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM) fund.

Furthermore, placing the entire province under a calamity state will also provide a legal basis for recovery programs as an aftermath of the typhoons.

The municipalities of Cainta, Rodriguez, and San Mateo have also passed separate resolutions as part of their localized declaration of State of Calamity.

Republic Act 7581 or the Price Act mandates a 60-day freeze at the prevailing prices of essential items such as canned sardines, processed milk, instant noodles, bottled water, bread, coffee, and detergent upon the official declaration of a state of calamity in an area. (PB-PIA4A)

September 2025 (for pensioners as of 31 August 2025): 10% increase - Retirement and

Disability Pensioners 5% increase - Death or Survivor

September 2026 (for pensioners as of 31 August 2026): Additional 10% increase - Retire-

ment and Disability Pensioners Additional 5% increase - Death or Survivor Pensioners

September 2027 (for pensioners as of 31 August 2027):

After three years, pensions will have increased by approximately 33% for retirement/disability pensioners and 16% for death/survivor pensioners.

Impact and Financial Sustainability

According to the SSS Chief Actuary, the reform will result in only a manageable reduction of fund life from 2053 to 2049, offset by stronger cash flows from previous contribution reforms and en-

hanced collection efforts. "Our actuarial team confirms that the fund remains financially sound," De Claro stressed. "We are committed to restoring fund life back to 2053 through coverage expansion and improved collection efficiency."

The reform will benefit over 3.8 million pensioners, including 2.6 million retirement/disability pensioners and 1.2 million survivor pensioners, and is projected to inject ₱92.8 billion into the econ-

omy from 2025 to 2027.

This Pension Reform Program (PRP) will not necessitate any contribution increase unlike the ₱1,000 additional benefit allowance given to all pensioners starting 2017 that immediately required contribution increases to restore financial stability to the SSS fund.

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'P77' is Director Derick Cabrido's most personal film to date

It is an honor and a privilege to have interviewed one of the most sought-after Filipino film directors of the horror genre thus far, Mr. Derick Cabrido whose body of works include "Untold", "Clarita", and "Mallari".

Asked how the new film "P77" fare on his previous films, "Clarita confronted demonic possession; Mallari unraveled historical evil through the lens of colonial trauma. Both films were large in scope-spiritual, operatic, mythic. But with P77, I wanted to turn the camera inward. Set in a luxury condo, the story unfolds not in exorcisms or serial killings, but in memory, silence, and suppressed grief. Luna, played with heartbreaking precision by Barbie Forteza, returns from abroad carrying emotional scars that the world doesn't see. Her journey is one of unraveling-not through spectacle, but through emotional truth. Barbie's performance is delicate, intuitive, and deeply immersive. She built the character from the inside outusing scent memory, physical rituals, and psychological research to convey PTSD in a way that feels real and raw", quipped Direk Derick.

Opposite her is Euwenn Mikaell, whose portrayal of Jonas elevates the tension with quiet menace. His shift from childlike warmth to something unsettling is one of the film's most chilling transformations. He doesn't just support the story—he tilts it. Together, they form the emotional axis of the film. Their dynamic speaks of love, abandonment, trauma, and the unspoken weight siblings often carry for each other.

I also leaned into sound design not as background—but as a psychological weapon. Echoes, gaps, and unsettling frequencies act like a second layer of storytelling. You're not just watching Luna descend—you're hearing it in your bones.

At its core, P77 is a meditation on love and how it fractures under pressure-on heartbreak that leaves no bruises, and on trauma that quietly rewrites who we are. The real horror isn't in apparitions or violence—it's in the emotional aftershocks that follow those we thought we'd left behind. Through Luna and Jonas, we explore the painful beauty of connection: how love tries to survive in haunted spaces, and how heartbreak and trauma

often speak in silence.

"This is horror shaped by feeling-not fright. And that, for me, makes P77 the most personal film I've ever made", Mr. Cabrido added.

"A film like P77 doesn't come to life in isolation—it's built on trust, collaboration, and the emotional labor of people who believe in the story as much as I do."

"I want to thank Enrico Santos, whose writing gave this film its beating heart. His words never settled for surface-they dared to go deeper, challenging the genre while grounding it in human truth. To my staff-thank you for navigating the chaos and beauty of filmmaking with grit, grace, and unframe count. To my cast, led by Barbie

Forteza and Euwenn Mikaell: you gave flesh and soul to Luna and Jonas. Your performances haunt me still-in the best way. You breathed life into silence, pain, and everything between.

"And to my producers Anj Atienza, Christian Julao, and Nessa Valdellon—thank you for trusting this vision. For believing in horror that feels. For backing a story that speaks in whispers, not just screams. Your support made this film possible, and your courage made it meaningful. P77 is more than a film. It's a shared reckoning. And I'm grateful to have shared it with each of you." Said Mr. Cabrido.
